
We interviewed Mr Morris, a PDHPE and health teacher at Bally, to give us insight into how this corruption is affecting our health and the relationship between students. # IS THE SWIMMING CARNIVAL TOO DANGEROUS???



The swimming carnival is a brilliant day for everyone involved. Year 7 to Year 12 can go swimming, hang out with friends and have an all-round good time.

A question, however, still remains - is the swimming carnival too dangerous?

Each year, hundreds of pupils compete in the Balgowlah Boys annual swimming carnival which goes for around 5 hours. This is a long time to be sitting in the sun as there is limited shade at the venue. This is dangerous as teachers can't physically apply sunscreen to a student, so the students inevitably don't all put on sun screen or drink water. All day.

This causes dehydration, sunburn and, worst-case scenario, could contribute to skin cancer. This problem would not exist if the venue was at an indoor location such as the Warringah Aquatic Centre.

The carnival is obviously about swimming, so this means that there will be a fair amount of risk involved. For example, what if someone hit their head on the bottom from diving too shallow and fell unconscious while in the water? Someone participating might not know how to swim and may drown if not under proper supervision. Sun stroke is also a big problem, and a few students had a case of it last year, even though the school didn't mention it in their report.

Therefore, more safety precautions must be put in place to avoid these things from happening. Currently, there are lifeguards supervising the racers at all times, and teachers direct students to the proper race area so no one dives in at the wrong end of the pool.

Well, the carnival can be dangerous, but only if a student is complacent enough to ignore a teacher's instructions.

# Make Balgowlah Boys Green Again
