With technology changing so rapidly, many students have so much information right at their fingertips. We interviewed Ms Anderson and she said "I'm sure someone has used it unfairly in the past."


It's quite obvious that, due to smart watches, cheating is rife. Even if the advantage is small, it is still unfair.
