ver the past four years, the Northern Beaches Secondary College has been focused on to enhancing student engagement, outcomes and future life

experiences through improving the wellbeing of our students. In short, our aim is to see our students connect, succeed and thrive.

In order to enhance the wellbeing of our students, a significant priority has been the professional learning of staff followed by exploring and embedding approaches related to positive psychology. Such approaches have clear evidence to show that it really makes a difference.

Experience from around the world has also shown that teachers who apply positive psychological approaches to their own work and life practices are then better able to enhance student wellbeing using the same strategies in the classroom. Gener-

ally for student wellbeing, by living it themselves, teachers are better able to teach it.

This is the thinking behind the introduction of the staff wellbeing initiative which has really begun to be more openly underway in the last weeks of Term 3.

Previously, across Northern Beaches Secondary College, volunteer staff members have shared stories of the times when their wellbeing is at its best. Subsequently, representatives from each campus have been preparing to assist staff to consider their own wellbeing. During this semester all staff are encouraged to take up the opportunity to get some feedback on what works well for them through the online tool The Resilience Report.

With the assistance of Macquarie University PACE students as an organisation, NBSC will be looking to develop practices and procedures which enhance the wellbeing of staff into the future. The online feedback tool The Resilience Report will also help to provide some trend data for our staff to consider the impact of implemented

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strategies. This exciting and innovative staff wellbeing initiative is a great opportunity for teachers to learn about and maximise their own wellbeing leading to greater opportunities for students.

Fourteen short films from the participating campuses were selected for the showcase at the NBSC Freshwater Senior Campus Performance Theatre.


Some campuses also entered their best short films in the national film competitions organised by the Goethe Institute, Modern Languages Teachers Association and the Japan Foundation.

From the class of 2009 at NBSC Manly Campus, now an Olympic Silver medallist in Rio 2016.


isa Darmanin, 24, with her cousin Jason Waterhouse, won silver in the mixed Nacra 17 multi-hull class in sailing, Wednesday, August 17 in Rio de Janeiro.

Today she visited her old school and spoke on assembly. She was interviewed by Year 12 students Lucinda Coleman (Captain) and Alexander Molchanoff. Asked about her memories of Manly Campus, she recalled that during her last week of schooling, her year introduced the tradition of carrying a watermelon around the school for an entire day. The student with the last remaining watermelon was the winner.



Lisa admitted that she has had her fair share of luck. The event she competed in, the mixed multi-hulled sailing, has never been offered at the Olympics before. She was partly chosen for the team because she was the ideal height, weight and was unlikely to grow anymore. A few years ago, in rough weather, she fell overboard, was caught in the rigging, and nearly drowned.

She has been sailing since she was 16. Training and competing with her cousin for two years, they together won the 2009 World Youth Championships. She is now preparing an America's Cup campaign.

PRIMARY ENRICHMENT AND CHALLENGE PROGRAM

INVESTIGATING LOCAL BIODIVERSITY AT MANLY DAM

Manly Dam was the scene for a day trip by the PECP on August 31.

oth the Cromer and Freshwater Senior Campus PECP students visited Manly Dam for a day's excursion to investigate biodiversity in the local environment. Staff from Gibberagong Environmental Education Centre supported this learning.

The students were engaged in a variety of hands-on activities throughout the day.

A number of tests on the dam water to investigate phosphate, dissolved oxygen, pH balance and turbidity were carried out with strict adherence to the principles of scientific enquiry.

The biodiversity of macro invertebrates in the dam was examined. Using dip-nets the students scooped out tiny creatures living in the dam.

Using an identification chart, they then rated the creatures according to their sensitivity to the environment. The presence of even one of the highly sensitive animals would indicate that the water in the dam was in good condition.

During a picnic lunch a consideration of the ethics of a real-life research project being undertaken by Sydney University on an invertebrate living in the dam generated lively discus-

sion with opinions being shared and thinking challenged.

A bush walk in the afternoon uncovered some aboriginal bush tucker and 'natural' lollies to try. The

students finished the day with the shedding of shoes and socks to soak their feet in the creek at the top of the waterfall and write poetry...experiential learning at its best!



NBSC SPORTS UPDATE

The Australian Snowsports Championships commenced last Wednesday, 6th September and concluded on Sunday, 11th September at Perisher Valley.

BSC were represented by 8 students, who had all qualified through via the State Championships the previous week in Thredbo.

The first of our students, Jasmine Omm (NBSC Mackellar) & Ty Hatch (NBSC Freshwater) competed in the SnowboardX. Racing was held on the Sun Valley RiderX Course at Perisher. It looked unreal. Long, fast and open, winding from the top of Sun Valley down and around the bowl.

Their results were as follows:Jasmine Omm (NBSC Mackellar) placed 13th, out of a field of 30, in the Female Div2 SBX. Ty Hatch (NBSC Freshwater) also placed 13th, out of a field of 43, in the Male Div1 SBX. The next of our chargers, Oscar Hume (NBSC Balgowlah) ran the Snowboard GS Course at Front Valley, Perisher.

Oscars result was as follows: Oscar Hume (NBSC Balgowlah) came 20th out of 44 in the Male Div2 SBGS division.

From what I heard, Saturday's conditions at Perisher were atrocious. With wind and buckets of rain about.

Our team of competitors involved on this day were Joey Steggall

(NBSC Balgowlah), Cait Halsted (NBSC Freshwater), Bella Roberts (NBSC Freshwater) & Mia Roberts (NBSC Freshwater).

Their results were as follows: In the Div3 Male SkierX, Joey Steggall placed midfield with a 23rd out of 49 racers. With another year to run in this division, Joey will no doubt improve his result when he's a year 8 student.

In the Div1 Female Moguls our team of Cait Halsted, Bella & Mia Roberts placed 4th, narrowly missing a place on the podium. This result was the best result of all our students at the Australian Championships. Individually the girls placed well with Cait in 8th, Mia 9th and Bella 16th out of a field of 22. Well done girls.

The Aussie Championships were concluded on the Sunday with the last event - The Div1 Female SkiGS team, which was raced at Zali's on Mt Blue Cow.

Mia Roberts unfortunately crashed on her second run and while she is OK, it did mean that her time didn't count toward the teams result.

Out of the 42 runners, Cait Halsted finished a very creditable 7th, Bella Roberts 28th, while Mia was DSQ'd.

Unfortunately Georgette Randall had to pull out of the Australian Championships due to another commitment.

Overall our team performed incredibly well at the Australian Championship's
