NBSC DMI EXPO PRESENTATIONS

Design Make Innovate (DMI) is a Design and Technology project involving 684 students.

MI is a collaborative project involving both primary and secondary students from NBSC and the NBLA. Over 150 Year 9 students from NBSC Balgowlah Boys, Cromer and Mackellar Girls Campuses mentored 520 primary students throughout this project. The Year 4, 5 and 6 students were from Brookvale, Dee Why, Harbord, Manly Village and Seaforth Public Schools.

Primary students worked in groups of 4 students to design and make a product using Caine's Arcade as an inspirational starting point or a bridge. NBSC Year 9 students mentored the primary groups in the new Design Thinking process and the preparation of the associated portfolio.

The DMI project culminated with an Expo held at the NBSC Freshwater Senior Campus. The best student works from each of the Primary Schools were showcased at the Expo. A panel of judges assessed the projects and selected an 'Outstanding Achievement Award' for each Primary School. Parents and visitors voted for a 'People's Choice Award' for each school. Certificates were

awarded during the presentation ceremony at NBSC Freshwater Senior Campus for these special awards. Certificates were also presented to all students who participated in the project at their own school.

NBSC year 9 mentors were highly praised for their leadership qualities throughout Design Make Innovate.





NBSC YEAR 7 GATS PROJECT NEWS SIM TEAMS DELIVER

Year 7 Gifted and Talented students at NBSC take up the challenge in creating news that is reputable.

he College provides a variety of programs designed to extend and challenge students' critical and creative thinking skills. The News Sim Project is an example of this – a unique program designed for our Year 7 gifted and talented students.

230 students from across the NBSC successfully participated in the project throughout this term. Students were challenged to question what was important in news story – success or integrity? And whether both could mutually exist?

Working in teams our students discovered what constitutes journalistic integrity; investigated how news corps operate and exploring different types of newspapers & features. The students investigated the concept of sensationalism, identifying fact from fiction and deconstructed the language of media criticism

With this knowledge students created a Media Watch episode and a newspaper which was published on

I really enjoy the challenge aspect of these workshops and it's so interesting to be learning other amazing subjects other than our normal spelling and Maths. The work that we do and the information we learn just stands out in my school life



In 2017 a bench (a utilitarian installation) was the objective of a brief where students researched Australian indigenous art. Colour, design and pattern were copied to create a thumbnail sketch in order to develop and understand the technical aspect of the work. Creating their own designs the students painted on lengths of timber.

A formal drawing lesson is a necessary unit as it gives those students who have not experienced art since year two an opportunity to gain some technical skill without fear of comparison or judgement from peers. These were their reflections. "Tricia I felt released as I lost my fear of comparison and enjoyed the freedom that blind contour gave me, each piece of art is unique" Critique needs careful training over years of studying art history and exposure to representational and conceptual art. Often it is as a result of work not being appreciated that blocks student development in the visual art area. "I loved exploring the pencil and scribbling, best of all"

Stimulus for the Enchanted Garden (below) was William Morris; arts and crafts movement (Pre-Raphaelites) Students looked at the famous wallpapers designed by him and used coloured pencils to make a copy to look at Morris's technique, they then designed their own images that would be painted as a mural in the hallway leading to our room.



t is time to reflect on our program in time past and time present.

Our aim is to encourage students to harness their imaginations and to release their creativity. We provide them with scaffolding beyond their level in the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, Literature and Maths. We challenge the students with problem solving activities which might be pursued individually or collaboratively. Their briefs in any area are structured carefully and specifically, to fulfill the objective of each active learning workshop.

As facilitators, we aim to inspire and motivate the students and they in turn are intrinsically engaged in their own learning.

This article is focusing specifically on Visual Arts and Poetry. Drama builds the skills necessary for our performance unit which culminates on our Celebration of Learning evening where students receive their certificates of attendance. The following poem is an excerpt from an Anthology of poetry the students produced based on Sylvia Plath's poem, 'The Mirror'. We spent time workshopping in drama inanimate objects which gave the students an understanding of what was required when penning their poems.
