Congratulations to NBSC Manly Campus 2019 Year 12 Graduate Richard Soegimin who was recently presented with his Gold Award at an official ceremony by Her Excellency General The Honourable Margaret Beazley AC QC. Richard was in the company of 73 students from across the State who were also presented with this prestigious Award. This concludes engagement in the award over a four-year period. He is among 18 Northern Beaches Secondary College students who completed their Gold Award in 2019. Richard has applied for a Marine Science degree at Macquarie University and will take advantage of the bonus ATAR points gained by completing the Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award.



Beaches to Borneo

Departure to Borneo for the team of 8 Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award students and their Northern Beaches Secondary College friends is imminent. The group of 21 have come together this term to deliver some terrific fundraising events including a Movie Night and Comedy Night at NBSC Freshwater Senior Campus raising over \$4,000. While abroad Team Hibiscus will immerse themselves in Malaysian communities and local culture to undertake life-enhancing projects and experiences such as the new construction and improvement of buildings and facilities, environmental protection against deforestation, and observations at an orang-utan and sun bear rehabilitation facility. The trip will also include a moving visit to Sandakan and the Death March memorial in Ranau where more than 200 Australian and British Prisoners of War marched to their death in 1945.

The student group will travel with Camps International and will be accompanied by two volunteer teachers, Ms Busse and Mr Beeby.

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Australian Business Week 2019

Critical thinking, problem solving and decision making were just some of the skills utilised by our students during Australian Business Week (ABW). Company teams were formed which began the takeover of a virtual retail electronics store. Students from NBSC Balgowlah Boys, Cromer, Mackellar Girls and Manly Campuses worked collaboratively under the guidance of their Business and Teacher Mentor, to effectively manage, market and operate their businesses. This culminated in a finals day where each company presented a business report, exhibited at a trade display, conducted an oral presentation on the company's progress over the past two virtual years, demonstrated their advertising and marketing skills by producing a 30 second advertisement and competed in a simulated share market, where every decision affected their share price.

Internal and external judges were present to evaluate each category based on specific criteria. Though some of the scores were quite close, there was one team that stood out above the others in the end. The winners of each category were:

Best Computer Simulation: TechTok

Best Business Report: Fidelis Technologies

Best Video Advertisement: Rewind

Best Trade Display: Fidelis Technologies

People's Choice Trade Display: Rewind

Best Oral Presentation: GIGA

NSW Premiers Sporting Challenge – Leading with Action Day

NBSC campus students are a part of the NSW Premier's Sporting Challenge Sport Leadership program. This program encourages and prepares students to take up active leadership roles in school sport and other planned physical activities.

The 'Leading with Action' Day was held on Monday 2nd December 2019 at Mike Pawley and Frank Gray ovals with over 160 students from NBSC Balgowlah Boys, NBSC Cromer Campus, NBSC Mackellar Girls and NBSC Manly Campus taking part. The day comprised of 3 x 90-minute coaching sessions facilitated by local, state and national sporting associations. During these workshops, the students acquired sport specific and small group management skills such as:

- identifying and discussing leadership strategies
- planning age-appropriate lesson activities
- practising small group management techniques

The second phase 'Learning 2 Lead' program will be held on Monday 6th April 2020, where 60 students will be selected from the Leading with Action day to coach 350 students from 9 partnering primary schools.

NBSC Basketball – Australian School Championships – Melbourne

On the 30th of November, 11 students from the Northern Beaches Secondary College travelled to Melbourne to play in the Australian Schools Championships from the 1-7th December. To broaden the boy's knowledge of Australia the team made some historical stops at the Dog on the Tuckerbox and Glenrowan the site of the final siege and capture of Ned Kelly.

Upon arrival at Melbourne, the warm up day consisted of a full day of 3 x 3 basketball to prepare for the week

of competition. The Championship was extremely challenging, with a loss in the first game by one point. Over the next three days, the NBSC team won 5 consecutive games, giving them a place into the semi-finals. Though the boys were extremely tired they were excited by their success. The finals round was highly contested going down to Doncaster High and finishing the tournament in 4th place.

The team was treated to a training session with Melbourne Phoenix, thanks to Benjamin Knight (Coach and ex Sydney Kings player), and learnt what it takes to become an elite player.

The final night of the Melbourne stay included dinner and a walk around the city centre before the long drive home on the following day. Congratulations to Noah Smith who was awarded Team Player of the tournament.

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Information night will provide you with detail about the requirements and expectations of the Award, hike dates and location, logging hours and the Online Record Book (ORB), assessors and more.

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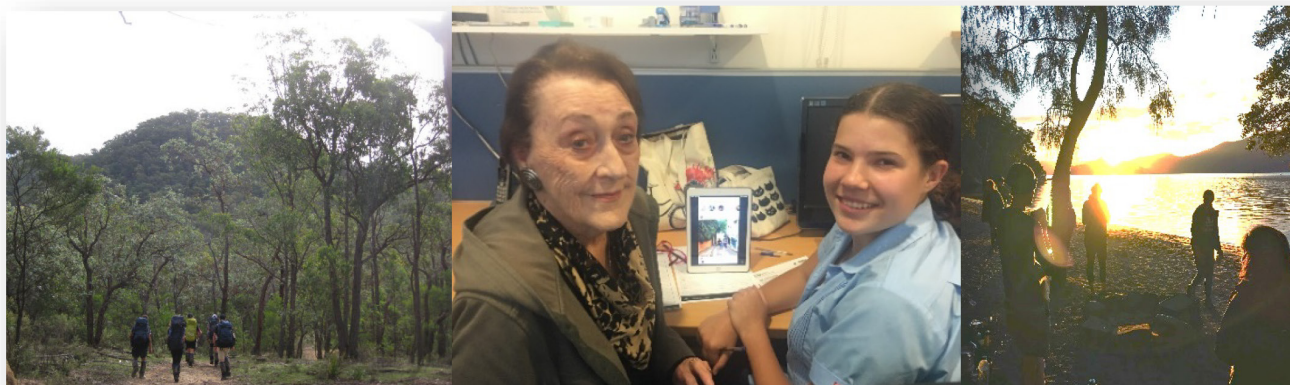

NBSC Jazz-Impro Program - Offbeat

Hello Parents & Students,

If you enjoy playing your instrument & like a challenge, then the College Jazz-Impro Program is for you!

You will learn how to improvise & you will learn how music works. That is, an understanding of theory & how to put it into practice - making your own music!

Most players master how to read music, but few learn to master improvisation. Yet it is one of the most satisfying & rewarding things possible in music. Whether you prefer rock, jazz, classical or any other kind of music, improvisation is important to them all. And the only way to learn it properly is to DO IT regularly - with a band !!

WHO CAN JOIN

There is NO AUDITION. Everyone starts as equals. Then you develop at your own pace. It is not about being competitive, it is about finding your own voice.

You DO NOT have to be a member of any other school band !! However, you are encouraged to play in as many bands as possible.

All instruments are welcome - not only 'jazz' instruments - strings, woodwind, brass, percussion & electronica. (i.e. if you scratch, sample, DJ etc).

HOW YOU PROGRESS

We begin with the Blues - Major & minor - and then move into more complex harmony & structure. How quickly you develop is up to you.

GIGS

Public performance is an important component of the Program. Performing in public helps you to develop confidence & greater proficiency at putting impro ideas into practice. Usually, a beginner is ready to do gigs after 2 terms of rehearsals.

Jazz-Impro Bands perform at, Manly Jazz Festival, The Co-Op Church Point, Brookvale Show, Vietnam War Vets Ceremony at Manly Corso, & other Warringah & Manly.

Council events. And (NBSC) College events - including Jazz Club - our annual BIG night with ex-students & special guests. Renowned improvisors Sandy Evans & Paul Cutlan have ran workshops with the bands & performed with them at Jazz Club.

YOUR FUTURE AFTER HIGHSCHOOL

Quite a few students from the Jazz-Impro Program pursue music as a career. Some at tertiary level in composition or jazz studies at the Con. Also, the Australian Institute of Music. Some include music as a subject in another degree. Others have continued on to play professionally in rock/pop/jazz/classical genres. And some simply play 'for themselves'. If you can improvise you can play for the rest of your life!

SUMMARY

Everything I have mentioned about the College Jazz-Impro Program can be read in books or looked at Online. This is, of course, useful. However, you can know the principles but still not be able to put them into practice. YOU need to actually DO IT on a regular basis to become proficient at improvisation.

TIMES

Beginners/Intermediate – Fridays 3.45-5PM (yrs. 7-8-9 more or less)
Intermediate/Advanced - Tuesdays 3.45-5PM PM (yrs. 10-11-12 more or less)
“more or less” means that if you cannot make one day you can attend on the other day.
These times can change from year to year depending on the commitments of players.
