














NBSC Student Leadership Conference



NBSC First Nations Australian Youth Leadership Conference

During NAIDOC Week, on Friday 13th November 2020, the inaugural NBSC First Nations Australian Youth Leadership Conference was held at Manly Golf Club for all First Nations students from across the college. The theme for the day 'Leadership is Everybody's Business' focused on equipping the students with a range of leadership skills they may use within their school, community and life after school. Keynote speakers included Julie Kennedy (DEL), Zali Steggall (OAM MP) and James Griffin (MP). Mr. Griffin presented Stacey Exner (NBSC Principal) with a Notice of Motion from the 57th Parliament of New South Wales congratulating each and every student for their participation and recognised the potential and promise of the students in the day.

Clarence Bruinsma (NSW DoE Aboriginal Education and Wellbeing Advisor) addressed the students about Leadership within Aboriginal Communities. He was extremely engaging, provided his experiences and consistently linked back to family/mob.

University of Sydney staff and current Indigenous students led interactive workshops where students participated in cultural yarning circles, talking up their strength's session and concluded with junior and senior breakout groups. The Years 7-9 group focused on developing leadership skills, resilience and leadership goal setting, while the Years 10 – 12 group focused on what makes a good leader and how to develop and use these leadership skills.

Illuminate NextGen Challenge

The Illuminate:nextgen Challenge was held during week 7 for Year 10 aspiring entrepreneurs. Over 100 students from across the college gathered for a week at NBSC Freshwater Senior Campus to participate in an authentic learning experience where they chose a relevant issue in their community and built a knowledge base around this to define the problem. They creatively explored possible solutions to develop business models to create sustainable change. The students also developed marketing strategies and even presented a pitch and prototype of their idea – with all aspects of the challenge aligned to the curriculum as well as the employability skill frameworks.

The students tackled some big issues in their local community and looked at how social enterprise could be a way to lead real change, all the while developing skills that will help them no matter what pathway they take into the future. These include communication (speaking, writing & presentation skills), understanding (critical thinking, inquiry, digital & financial literacy), solving problems (creativity, problem solving & reflection), working smart (collaboration, organisation & perseverance).
